Audience	LEARN NC Tip
Teachers who don't visit the media center.	Use the <b>Email This</b> option under "tools" on an article, website record or lesson plan. Include an invitation to the media center and an offer to help with instruction.
Classes that visit the media center only for book check-out.	Locate lessons relevant to novel studies and research projects. Use the <b>Printer-friendly Format</b> and highlight the section you will cover in the media center.
Teachers in second languages, arts and other disciplines trying to integrate core grade-level content in their teaching.	Use the <b>Search</b> page to locate interdisciplinary materials. Specify a language or media type.
Teachers new to North Carolina or new to the classroom. [and their mentors]	Print <b>New Teacher Support</b> articles and show them the printable <b>Standard Course of Study</b> .
Teachers who do the same assignment over and over every year.	Use <b>Best of the Web</b> to create a pathfinder of new, engaging online resources on the topic.
Students looking for websites they can use on their own.	Use <b>LEARN NC for Students</b> – grade-specific media centers with relevant, developmentally-appropriate websites.
Students working on research assignments.	Use <b>Research Guide</b> and <b>Reference</b> sites in LEARN NC for Students.
Students, teachers and parents working at home.	Use LEARN NC to populate your web page with the best resources. Include links to <b>LEARN NC for Students</b> and <b>NC WiseOwl</b> .
