- Keep track of what you need and want for your program and school.
 - Make sure you and your administrators are on the same page.
 - often to keep your budget in mind.
- . Join some listservs that share grant info.
- Keep some basic info on your school such as: history (ask CO, LONG-timers, etc. for history), demographics, strengths & weaknesses, which teachers will partner with you.
- Don't be afraid to write a grant. The worst they can say is "no."
- Dream big and be willing to divide up the grant project into different grants.
- Check the grant requirements to determine if they are feasible for you.
- Take "stock" photos of your students at work; be in a few of the pictures. Get

- permission forms from parents.

 Donorschoose has great examples of stock photos.
- Keep blank thank you notes at hand.
 Student made ones are cool too.
- Make note of interesting events involving your grant funded items/event. Donors love these.
- Know your school's mission statement and contact information.
- Know your reach on social media.
- . Pay attention to timing
 - Pace yourself
 - . When is the best time to post a crowdsourcing project.

History of Falkland Elementary School

- Deed obtained by PCS 1905. (Pitt Co. OPIS, Parcel 35794)
- Original school location of the white school is now the current site of a church. Jeff Tyson
- Front building was built in 1957. (Pitt Co. OPIS, Parcel 35794)
- There was a pink building where the art trailer is. This building housed the Special Education classes. Jeff Tyson
- Rooms 200 and 202 were not originally classrooms; they were the library. Jeff Tyson
- The new buildings and additions were opened in 1990. The Dunn Family
- Falkland Elementary was built in 1957 with additions opening in 1991. Falkland School has served as an all black high school, a K-12 school and currently serves Kindergarten through fifth grades. Falkland is a Title I school with 100% free breakfast and lunch. Currently, we serve students from Greenville, Farmville, Falkland, and Fountain North Carolina. Our enrollment is around 350 to 400 students and we serve a transient population.
- As for demographics, we have 100% free breakfast & lunch. Many of our students do not have reliable transportation or Internet access if any away from school. This means that they don't go to the public library. When I informally asked what books they have at home, they always reply our library or classroom books. Most can't name a book that they

own except for what they received during last year's Give 5 read 5. Our students face eviction on a regular basis which means they are constantly losing what little they did have. On the upside, our school has several community partners who assist with food, clothes, and school supplies. We have great students who have not so great circumstances.
