8th Annual Librarian to Librarian Networking Summit—February 2, 2013



Librarian to Librarian Networking Summit

Dream. Discover. Explore.



On Saturday, February 2nd, more than 220 school media coordinators, facilitators, and volunteers eagerly gathered at J.Y. Joyner Library for the 8th Annual Librarian to Librarian Networking Summit. Organized by the faculty and staff of the Teaching Resources Center (TRC), the annual professional development opportunity was designed to encourage K-12 school library media coordinators to communicate with each other, and the educational community at large, as they learn and share skills necessary to become more effective school librarians. The sessions, covering a wide variety of topics, included more than 30 roundtable discussions facilitated by experts. With “Dream. Discover. Explore” as this year’s theme, some of the most popular sessions included, “The 21st Century Library Media Program and the New North Carolina School Library Media Coordinators Standards,” “Using Digital Tools to Extend Learning,” “Getting to the Core: Opportunities for Quality Media Programs,” “Track It! Documenting Your Impact on Student Achievement,” and



“Marketing Your Media Center: Ideas and Strategies for Bringing Your Students, Staff, and Community Closer to Your Media Center.”

The day began with an engaging keynote address by [Michael Dahl](#), a witty and entertaining award-winning author of more than 100 books for children and young adults, and concluded with a panel discussion centered on the Common Core State Standards recently implemented by the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction. Esteemed panelists included Frances Bradburn, North Carolina New Schools and the Golden LEAF Foundation; April Dawkins, President, North Carolina School Library Media Association (NCSLMA); Kathy Parker, School Media Consultant, North Carolina Department of Public Instruction; Dennis Teel, Principal, and recipient of the 2007 NCSLMA Administrator of the Year award; Ms. Cal Shepard, North Carolina State Librarian.

I am so grateful for the opportunity to meet my colleagues and share ideas,” “You have kept the cost down. ETC Room At Your Service

The ETC (Enhancing Teachers' Classrooms) Room is one of the most popular areas of the TRC. This area provides equipment and resources for patrons to create and produce materials for lesson units as well as materials for their classroom. The room houses three Ellison die-cut centers with more than 800 die-cuts, a poster maker, two

laminating machines, two art waxers, a GBC binding system, a badge maker, a light box, three computer workstations with educational software and scanners as well as paper cutters and other office supplies. We encourage you and your students to take advantage of this wonderful service especially the 10 feet of free laminating.
