




Shelter Patricia Aust <u>F AU73S</u>


Fish for Jimmy: Inspired by One Family's Experience in a Japanese American Internment Camp Katie Yamasaki <u>E Y147F</u>

TeachingBooks.net is an easy-to-use database that adds a multimedia dimension to the reading experiences of children's and young adult books. It is developed and maintained to include thousands of resources about fiction and nonfiction books used in the K–12 environment, with every resource selected to encourage the integration of multimedia author and book materials into reading and library activities. The database's homepage provides links to online tutorials, book discussion guides, lesson plans, book trailers, Common Core literacy connections, curricular uses, and more. NoveList Plus

NoveList Plus is a comprehensive online readers' advisory tool used to search hundreds of thousands of popular fiction and nonfiction titles, and also retrieve author read-alikes, book lists, book discussion guides, and more. It includes genre outlines and online training materials for librarians, preservice students, and teachers to familiarize themselves with multiple aspects of readers' advisory. Users can search titles within the database by grade level, Lexile score, number of pages, Dewey range, Lexile range, audience, publication date, fiction/nonfiction, and more. 
