From the Friends President

As President of the Friends of the ECU Library I would like to introduce myself and let you know why I support the Friends. I was a music major at ECU from 1966 to 1970. After working as a music teacher in the Norfolk (VA) Public Schools (1970-74) and after getting my master's degree in library science at Drexel University (1974-77) I was library director at North Carolina Wesleyan College (1976-82), Elon College (now University) (1982-94), and Catawba College (1985-2000).While at Elon I was awarded the Ph.D. in Information and Library Science (1983-91) from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. I taught as an adjunct professor of library science at University of North Carolina at Greensboro while working at Catawba.

In 2001 I was hired as an Associate Professor Library Science at ECU in 2001. I am now a Full Professor of Library Science and have served in the Master of Library Science Program for the past 20 years. I have had extensive experience in education-related activities, including public school music teaching (4 years), academic library administration (25 years), and teaching in the Master of Library Science program here at ECU (20 years).

Yes, I'm an old guy, but I have thoroughly enjoyed and continue to enjoy my work in education and librarianship. I have witnessed the meteoric rise of the ECU Library from my days as an ECU student to the present. The ECU Library is an incredible resource for ECU, the community, the state, and the nation

Friends are able to check out materials and other materials from the library and access numerous online databases from within the library. Friends are even able to tap the resources of other libraries throughout the state, nation, and world through interlibrary loan services. Since the Covid-19 pandemic descended upon us in the Spring of 2020, the Friends has had to make many adjustments to how we achieve our mission. Our Spring Banquet has traditionally been the main event of the Friends, an opportunity to thank members and share a program featuring local and state authors. Due to Covid-19 and its variants we have not been able to host our Spring Banquet since the spring of 2019. The Friends Board voted at its last quarterly meeting in November 2021 to not have a Spring Banquet this spring of 2022.

The most promising possibility that surfaced was to investigate what would be a continuous online auction of items for sale to Friends and others. We already have items that we were not able to auction at our last banquet in the spring of 2019.

The most pressing action is to find someone or a company to manage the website. Interestingly, I noted in using Ebay personally that many of the items I purchased were available from charities and Friends of the Library groups throughout the nation. Ideas and volunteers are both welcomed.



Why am I a member of the Friends of the Library Board?

Well, in the dark ages, when I had a paying job as a community college president, the library was not actually called a library but the learning resource center or LRC. At meetings of community college presidents, one of the things I would hear my colleagues brag about was having 50,000 volumes in their LRC. My college met that lofty goal only after I instructed the LRC Dean to stop "weeding" the collection. Her protest about some nursing manuals in the stacks listing "bleeding" as a proper medical procedure fell on deaf ears!

But seriously, I always recognized our LRC as the center of the college. All our educational programs depended on a strong LRC for support. A lot of success in the classroom began in our two-story LRC. Of course, my LRC Dean would have loved to hear me say that back in the day when what she really thought was, we grossly underfunded the LRC.



My own journey to appreciate the LRC or library, if you will, began at Lenoir Community College in Kinston (69-71). The LRC at LCC was in the center of campus so you had to pass by that newest college building to get anywhere. The LRC also had the most comfortable chairs on campus so it was always good for a pit stop. Not a lot changed concerning my attitude about libraries when I attended East Carolina as an undergrad (76, BS in Social Work) where I tried to avoid having to spend much time in the then much smaller Joyner Library with its main entrance on the mall. Several years later, even work on a Masters in Adult Ed from ECU did not require that many visits to Joyner. If Joyner had been a church, they would have handed me a visitor name tag for my lapel each of my seldom visits!

In time my thinking changed about the importance of the library. In the mid 80's I began work on an Ed.D in higher education administration. Remember, the early 80's period was pre-internet. Online did not mean anything because there was no online! Research meant searching the stacks and that I did here at ECU's Joyner Library, the DH Hill Jr. Library at NC State, and the Kathrine R Everett Law Library at UNC-CH. This was an era when my research began at the card catalog and was collected and stored on "punch cards." Like I said, dark ages stuff. All that research brought me a new-found appreciation for the library. While working on that most important dissertation, I received a lot of help from dedicated librarians literally all over the state. They not only helped point me in the right directions in the stacks, but kindled a spark that helped me realize just how central the library was to learning.

I hope that belief in a strong library was reflected in my support of our LRC at Stanly Community College during the 21 years I was vice-president and then president there.

Not long after retiring, my wife Alice and I were having dinner with longtime friends Johnnee and Danny Rice. During the course of dinner and conversation Johnnee, a member of the Friends Board, casually asked if I would be interested in serving on the board. That simple inquiry began a long association with Joyner through the Friends. My membership on the Friends Board has also allowed me to meet and greatly appreciate the hardworking Joyner staff, so ably led by Jan Lewis.

I hope that the Friends have gained half as much from my membership on the board as I have from my association with them.




